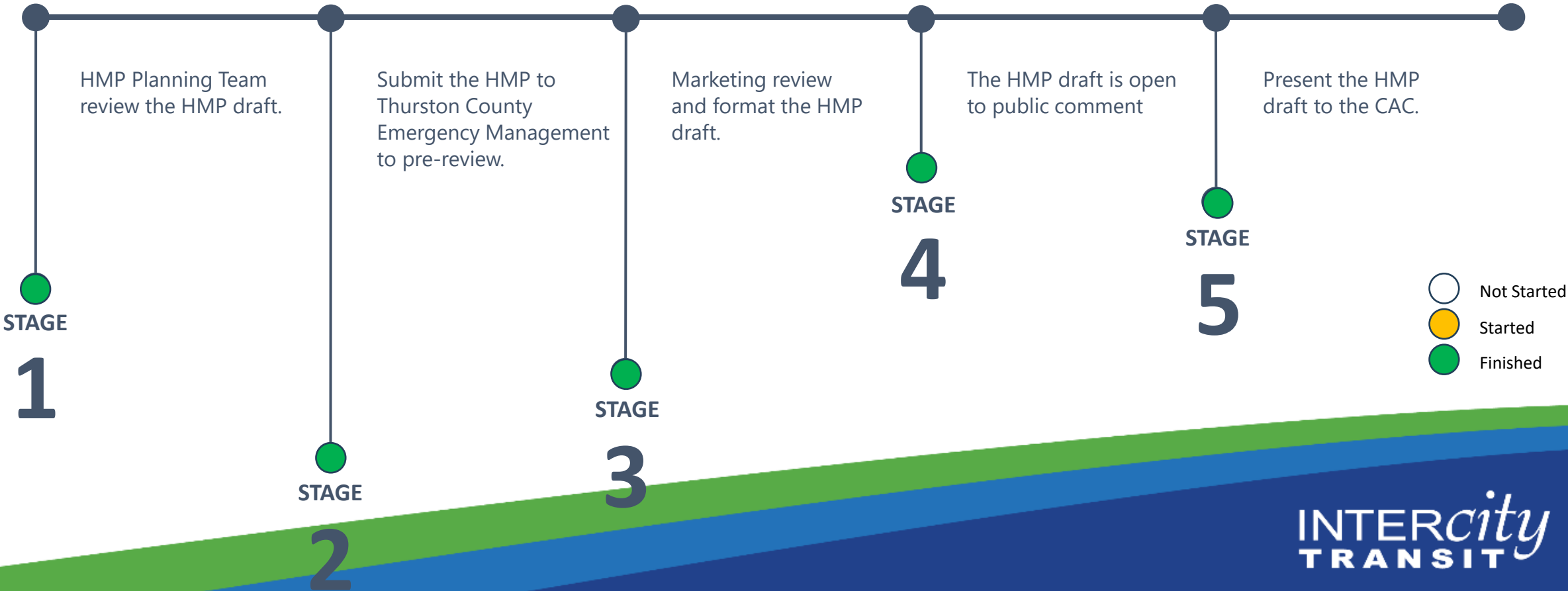

Our Proposed Mitigation Initiatives

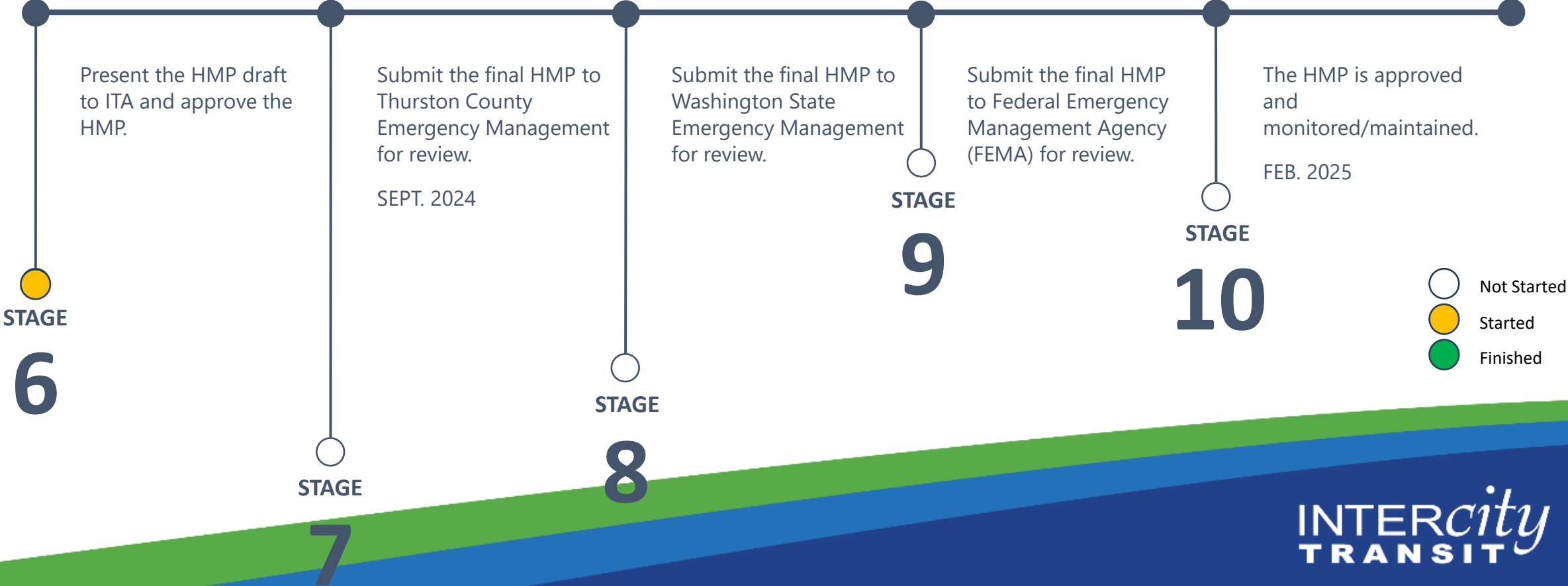
1. Update Emergency Operations Plan and Develop Continuity of Operations Plan.
2. Provide Emergency Preparedness and Response Training to Employees.
3. Determine Feasibility of a Mobile Command Center.
4. Investigate alternate power supply to support critical infrastructure at the Olympia Transit Center and determine feasibility.
5. Evaluate and Prioritize Non-Structural Seismic Retrofit Options and Costs for Maintenance Building.
6. Evaluate and Prioritize Structural Seismic Retrofit Options and Costs for Maintenance Building.
